

One for the Record Books.



On February 5th, 2017 in front of 70,807 NFL fans, the New England Patriots and the Atlanta Falcons went head-to-head in an epic Super Bowl showdown to determine the champions. The game started on the rough side with a scoreless 1st quarter before the Falcons scored 21 unanswered points while the Patriots scored a field goal with 2 seconds left in the 2^{nd} quarter to make it a 21-3 Falcons lead at halftime. Then in the 3rd quarter, the Falcons increased their lead with a touchdown and then midway through the 3rd, Falcons QB Matt Ryan completed his second touchdown pass. In the 4th quarter, the Patriots made the biggest Super Bowl comeback in history by scoring 25 unanswered points to tie the game, 28-28 with 57 seconds left in regulation time. In overtime, the Patriots won the coin toss, they took the ball and drove 75 yards to win with a 2-yard touchdown run by Patriots RB James White. This victory gave New England their 5th Super Bowl ring and Tom Brady was crowned as the MVP of the game for the 4^{th} time with 466 total yards, 2 touchdowns and 1 interception. The Super Bowl halftime show featured Lada Gaga and the National Anthem by country singer, Luke Bryan. The event took place at the NRG Stadium in Houston, Texas while the coin

toss was presented by Former President George H.W. Bush and his wife, Barbara Bush. This Super Bowl win for the Patriots aided them into a 3-way tie with the Cowboys & 49ers for 2nd place on the alltime Super Bowl win list, just behind the Steelers. Once the game ended, more than 30 team or individual Super Bowl records had either been matched or broken.


PUTTING THE PIECES TOGETHER – BY RICHARD














A PRAYER IN SPRING - BY ROBERT FROST

For this is love and nothing else is love, The which it is reserved for God above To sanctify to what far ends He will, But which it only needs that we fulfill.





LIVING WITH AUTISM AND THE SYSTEMATIC STRUGGLES FACING ME – BY STEVEN

I am "the new guy" to Opportunity Networks. I am thirty, living with my family, albeit small; no siblings. By the time you read this it will be Father's Day, and I never had a dad in my life. One thing I can safely say is I intend to gain more social networks here as time goes on. Resources are always at a strain because of my small network. I do not immediately go into friendships and often I struggle retaining long term relationships (more on this later.) I also am an autistic, where to be honest autistic traits require a specific skill, tolerance, patience that other "developmental disabilities" could gain. No other program has offered this or tries to. As I began in March; I had just turned thirty and came from what I describe is a "toxic environment". This column explains the feelings entering into Opportunity Networks.

I do not know what it's like to live my life to the fullest. I've been given a lot of praise, that it's now just humming noises in my head. I've been given so many mixed messages in my adolescent life. I had been in school, in out of district special education programs; "traditional" thirty hour day programs; and had been in two area agencies; and several other day programs in the Greater Nashua area. Many years of experience taught me how much progress will be needed for everyone with disabilities to have a successful and equitable life. Also all programs I couldn't fit in, and customized services were non existent and sadly it still exists. At the same time within the last year some of these programs where staff and management treats the clients all the same; to be hopeless and helpless individuals. In short this is the case example of the "cookie cuttered" effect. Staffing and revolving doors was another issue; one could argue that they were young and "figuring" themselves out; but it wasn't in the best interest for my group. Sadly this also disrupted my ability for wanting *stability* and long term relationships. Why trust someone if they are going to leave (or come back then leave once again?)

These experiences, unfortunately painted me with a negative image; as well as *experiencing* these same negative programs. One of my programs; they had called me "an intelligent young man"; but on the other hand, they were treating me like a teenager. At times, via observations; I felt bad for the other clients who were functioning people; but were basically suppressed for speaking for themselves. I've experienced first hand that managers in many programs would talk the talk and not walk the walk. They would claim they would be in the interest of "developmental disabilities" but their *actions* would to take that phrase so literally to think they are not capable of growing up. Being in this environment, I personally felt as if I wasn't growing. Humans are supposed to

grow and mature; in some cases for me it was *nurture* (not *nature*) that had held me back. (To be fair, the management here has been a breath of fresh air! And no I am not getting compensated for stating this!)

I'm also a former self advocate. I use this in past tense because for a number of years I had been in direct relations with Concord based interest groups as well as state employees (relevant to my group). I used to attend an annual conference for family support in the North Country, and stopped going a year ago. This has been "work"; speaking and pushing change to this group was so counterproductive, some *clearly* was treating me like a wallflower. I was so desperate that Adele's *Hello* was on loop because I felt so hopeless. Yes, you read that right; it escalated to be like "there will be no decent program for me", "I won't ever find my dream support team or personnel", "people won't help *push with* me to move forward not the other way around." Fortunately, for the most part the feelings has dissipated.

Given my life experiences, I do come in skeptical, in some days I feel like I may be raining on the parade here. I struggle with the fact if even the "real world" can cope with me and vise versa. Even more, when I am put under pressure, because it could happen. There are likes and things I aspire to be but I keep that internal as a "secret recipe" to my life; because for many years I'd start talking then people could take my ideas, "steal" them for their own agendas; or use it to say "no" or what. And my own happiness is no one else's business to be honest. I hope I don't become "a piece of work" as some say about tough clients.
