Culinary Corner: Serving Up Some Fun with Homemade Personal Flatbread Pizzas

I have been participating in cooking classes for a while and have always loved learning new prepping and cooking techniques. Recently, my cooking class made our very own homemade flatbread pizzas. We even got to use dough that our staff made at home the night before!

Before we started the class, we all sat down together to make a

shopping list so we knew exactly what we needed at the grocery store. My friends and I chose onions, olives, tomatoes, and pepperoni. We had lots of fun picking out all the ingredients before leaving and making sure we had everything.

I was able to help with every step of the process and enjoyed independently slicing up onions and cooking them until they were perfectly caramelized. We also rolled out and kneaded the dough so we could have a flat surface to add all our toppings! The best part was learning how easy it actually is to



make them, and I really enjoyed the whole process. I gave this meal a solid 7.5 out of 10, and I'm really excited to continue growing my knowledge in the kitchen with more recipes to come!



If you'd like to make this at home, here's a list of ingredients and steps we took to create this delicious meal:

Flatbread Pizza Recipe

Ingredients:

- Pizza dough store-bought works well, but I preferred using the homemade dough!
- A large jar of pizza sauce

- Shredded mozzarella cheese (you can also substitute your favorite cheese)
- All the toppings you want! Here's what we used, plus a few other suggestions that could take your recipe to the next level:
 - Caramelized onions
 - Tomatoes
 - Olives
 - Pepperoni
 - Bacon
 - o Spinach, etc.

Steps:

- 1. Preheat your oven to 375°F.
- 2. Place your pre-made dough on a surface lightly covered with flour (this prevents it from sticking).
- 3. Begin kneading the dough with your hands add a little flour to your hands, too, so the dough doesn't stick.
- 4. If you're using caramelized onions like we did, chop the onions into small pieces.
- 5. Heat a pan on the stove with a bit of olive oil, then add the onions. Stir and cook until they turn golden brown, then set them aside.
- 6. If using olives, slice them into smaller pieces as well.
- 7. Place the pizza dough on a greased baking sheet. Use a spoon to evenly spread pizza sauce across the surface.
- 8. Sprinkle shredded cheese evenly over the sauce.
- 9. Add your chosen toppings as much or as little as you'd like!
- 10. Once the oven is preheated, bake your personal pizzas for about 15 minutes, or until the cheese is fully melted and the crust is golden brown.

1. Mack's Apples

Mack's Apples is located at 230 Mammoth Road in Londonderry. To purchase a small bag to go apple picking it is \$12.00. They offer a variety of fruits to pick like apples, strawberries, pears, peaches and



they have pumpkins to choose from.
The best month to go apple picking is
October for late season apples like
Fuji, Granny Smith, and Braeburn!
They also have a farmers market
where they sell the star of the show
Apple cider donuts! I have visited
many times, it is one of my favorite

fall activities!

I would rate Mack's Apples a 10, because I think it is a fun place for children and adults to go to in the fall. The apples are easy to reach and there are so many to choose from. They taste so sweet!

2. Elwood Orchard

Elwood Orchard is also in Londonderry, at 54 Elwood Road. It has been a family owned business since 1910! They have apples, peaches, yellow plums, pumpkins, and cherries to pick! A corn maze is available for visitors from 8am to 6pm daily. During halloween season, they have "Hellwood's Cursed Forest,



which is a haunted corn maze. They have "Fright Night" on Friday October 17th, 24th, and 31st from 7 to 10pm and Saturday, October 18th, and 25th from 6 to 10pm. They also do a "Fright Light" for a more child-friendly experience during the day on Friday October 17th, 24th, and 31st from 6 to 7pm. As well as Saturdays on October 11th from 11 to 3pm, the 18th and 25th from 6 to 7pm, October 12th, 19th, and 26th from 11 to 3pm. This haunted experience is 100% volunteer based and 100% of the proceeds go to charities such as Manchester Girl Scouts, Future in Sight, and Nashua Soup Kitchen!

My rating for this Orchard would be a 9, I have never been but I think the Fright Night is freaky and cool. I also think it is awesome that they donate 100% of their proceeds to charities.

3. Concord Fall Craft Fair

Concord is holding a Fall craft fair on Saturday, November 22nd and Sunday, November 23rd at the Bow High School. The hours for Saturday are 9am to 4pm, and on Sunday 9am to 1pm. It is a free entry but if you are looking to take crafts home from vendors the prices may

vary! The vendors who attend are people who create their own crafts to showcase and sell, so there is a large variety of crafts for people to browse or purchase.

My rating for the Fall Craft

Fair would be a 5. Even though I like crafts, I have never been to a craft fair and I don't think I would enjoy walking around browsing for a long time.

4. Concord Car Show at the Fall Food Truck Festival

Concord is hosting a car show at the Fall Food Truck Festival on Saturday, November 15th, 11am to 4pm located at Rollins



Park. It is only \$1.00 per person, kids under 5 and dogs of all ages are free. You can just attend or bring your antique or unique car to display. All cars will be displayed in park- no revving or idling. They award 1st, 2nd, and 3rd prizes. While you are attending,

you can also enjoy the food truck festival, live music, markers, vendors, holiday shopping, dog businesses of all kinds, kid zone, and dog watching. This event is dog friendly and there will be special markers set up to keep the dogs at a safe distance from the cars. All dogs must be well-behaved and leashed! The kid zone includes hay rides and even a petting zoo.

I would rate this event a 7! It sounds like fun and pretty cool to see the cars and who they compete with. I definitely would like to go to the car show and try out the different foods from all the different trucks. I think that it is considerate of them to allow owners to bring their dogs.

5. Sunny Crest

Sunny Crest Farm is also located in Londonderry on High Range Road. It offers a pick-your-own apples, pumpkins, strawberries, blueberries, and cherries, farmer's market, and a bak-

ery. With apple season coming to an end, they are starting pick your own pumpkins at their pumpkin patch! They also offer hands-on farming and harvesting of




your very own crops in their pick your own fields. They have a season for everything at Sunny Crest, whether it's harvesting your own crops in the summer or picking blueberries in July, to picking your own pumpkins in October! They also have a small animal farm where you can feed and pet the goats, sheep, and sometimes a pig.

I rate this farm an 8, I have never been, but after researching it I would love to go there to pick apples and pumpkins. I can see myself visiting in the fall rather than the summer. In the future, I want to make plans with my friends and go as a group!

6. Screeemfest Canobie Lake Park

Screeemfest at Canobie Lake Park is another great activity for those brave enough! It is located at 85 N. Policy Street in Salem, New Hampshire. Screeemfest starts September 20th and goes till November 1st. The park organizes a haunted experience, with actors all throughout the park and haunted houses. The prices vary, on Fridays and Sundays it is \$49.00 and \$59.00 on Saturdays, and between \$30.00 to \$40.00 for general admission. The park stays open and operates all of it's

rides like usual, if you want to experience the haunted houses you have to purchase separate tickets from general admission. They offer five different haunted houses,



live shows, and they only do this during the night.

I rate Screeemfest a 9, because I like scary Halloween nights and I also enjoy rides and good amusement park food! I would really like to visit here while they do the Screeemfest! All their rollercoasters and rides stay open while Screeemfest happens, which is cool because If I get too scared I can always avoid the actors by going on the rides.

7. Fright Kingdom

Fright Kingdom is another haunted attraction located at 12 Simon Street in Nashua, New Hampshire. Tickets purchased online are \$38.00, but if you purchase them in person at the ticket booth, they are \$45.00. They offer different Halloween themes throughout different months- "Halfway to Halloween" in May, "Hardly Haunted" in October, "In the dark" in November,

and "Fright before Christmas" in December. Each theme offers five different haunted attractions to walk through. This attraction only offers haunted walk-



through, no rides. It does not seem to be very kid friendly, unless they are brave! They are only open Fridays and Saturdays from 7 to 10pm.

I rate Fright Kingdom an 8. I like how they do different themes throughout the months, and it seems pretty scary! I would like to maybe go here at night and experience the haunted attractions. I just hope it wouldn't be too scary! I wish they had other attractions like rides or games.

8. Nightmare New England

Nightmare New England is a very popular haunted attraction, located at Mels Funway Park (454 Charles Bancroft Highway, Litchfield, New Hampshire). They offer four different haunted attractions, one being the award-winning haunted hayride that takes you through 80 acres in the woods of Litchfield. They are the number one annual event in New Hampshire! Not only do they offer the haunted attractions but they also have a prescare party, fire pits, pumpkin bar, zombie paintball, axe throwing, beer garden, go karts, mini golf, gift shop and so much more. General admission is \$44.99, and VIP tickets are \$69.99. They are open Thursday to Sunday, 6 to 10pm.

I would rate Nightmare New England a 8. I like the idea of haunted houses and going there at night. It seems like it is scarier than some of the other attractions, and it is said the hayride is the scariest! I think it would be fun to go with a group of friends. I have talked about going with some friends in the past. I would like to do the day's activities like mini golf and go karting first, and maybe if I am feeling brave enough, hit Nightmare New England later in the night with family or friends to take on the haunted adventure with!

Local Attractions:


- 1.Deerfield Fair vs. 4 Spooky World: Rides, Food, Animals what more could you ask for? Deerfield Fair moves on

Local Attractions:


